GREEN IN WITNESS BOX

Crown Case Ends In Murder Trial

Definite denials that he was implicated in the slaying of two women at Glenroy on November 12, or that he had been in the locality since the beginning of August, last year, were made in the Criminal Court yesterday by George Green, 38 years, chimney sweep, who is on trial before a jury in the Criminal Court on a charge of having murdered Annie Wiseman, 63 years, and her niece, Phyllis Wiseman, 17 years. The hearing is before Mr. Justice Lowe.

Green pleaded not guilty to the charges and is defended by Mr. L. Little (instructed by Mr. J. Barnett). Mr. Book, K.C., is conducting the case for the Crown.

Continuing the police evidence, Senior Detective Delminico said he had taken samples of hair from a chestnut horse driven by Alex Aitken, at whose house Green was living.

At the detective office witness said to Green that he had accounted for his whereabouts for approximately nine hours by saying that he had lain down and gone to sleep. It was suggested to Green that if he could point out the place, he would be taken to it. Green was also told that if there were any persons whom he had seen or to whom he had spoken an endeavor would be made to locate them. Delminico said he asked Green if there was anything that the police could check up for him, and Green replied, "No, you can do nothing for me."

Asked by Mr. Little if he attached importance to the piece of hair found on the connection of the bicycle pump, Delminico said he had thought it should be examined. It was because the analyst told him the hairs were from a chestnut horse, that he took the samples from the horse at Green's place.

Charles Anthony Taylor, Government analyst, said he viewed the bodies of the two deceased at the City Morgue on November 13 and examined the Glenroy house on that and the following days, when he found a number of grey hairs. He examined the clothing taken from Green, and found several long white hairs, which he said were similar in length and identical in texture and color to the hair of Miss Annie Wiseman.

Taylor said that on November 22, he examined a bicycle pump, which seemed to have been lying out in the weather. He took a chestnut horse hair from the connection. Later Detective Delminico handed him an envelope containing horse hairs, some of which were similar in color and texture to the one taken from the connection.

Witness then described how he removed dirt from the connection and found that it contained soot, sand grains and mineral dust. Referring to the flannel singlet among Green's clothing, he said: "I extracted dirt from the shoulder of the garment and found there were particles of soot, some sand grains and mineral ash."

Witness described a dark mark or stain near the neck of the pyjamas worn by the elder Miss Wiseman and said it consisted of tiny particles of carbon.

Phyllis Wiseman's pyjamas there were some blood stains and a stain which appeared to have been caused by the garment being grasped by a dirty hand. Taylor said he extracted dirt and it contained particles of carbon.

Mr. Little: You went to the Morgue to examine the bodies?

Taylor: Yes.

That was an unusual role for you as an analyst?—Yes.

Why did you go to the Morgue?—Because I was told a double murder had been committed and the police wanted me to assist them.

What was the object of viewing the bodies?—From my experience I have found I am asked all sorts of unusual questions, and I thought it would be useful to me to view them.

The Crown case closed at 1.50 p.m. and Mr. Little announced that the accused would give evidence, but that he did not propose to adduce any other testimony.

Meeting With Two Men

Green, on being sworn, said he lived with the Aitken family in Bamfield-road, West Heidelberg, until November 17, and had been a chimney sweep for five or six years, doing most of his work in the suburbs and the country. On Monday, November 7, Green said, he had a conversation with Mrs. Thomas at Coburg and she gave him a note with the address, 118 Collins-street. He went to that address about 5 p.m. that day, but no one was at home.

"On Thursday evening," said Green, "I met a chimney sweep and a mat vendor whom I did not know. They asked me where I had been working and I had the price of a drink. I said: 'I have just started and have not earned it.' They said they were going to Merlynston, and I said: 'If you are Merlynston way this might do you

some good,' and handed them the address. I said: 'It's not a certainty. I went there and no one was home.'"

Green said he had met sweeps in the course of his work before. There were, he said, between 40 and 50 sweeps in Melbourne, and he himself had been given jobs in the same way as had given the job to the two men he met. From the Monday till Friday he earned about £4. He paid 6/ a day to Mrs. Aitken for lodgings.

"On Saturday morning, November 12, I went to South Morang on the bicycle belonging to George Reid," Green continued. When shown a bicycle pump found at Heidelberg Green said it was exactly the same as the one he had on the bicycle he had ridden, and that it would fit the clips on the machine with a little pressure.

Green attempted, with the bicycle stood on the barristers' table, to fit the pump on to the clips on the bicycle. He was unsuccessful, and he then said: "It appears to me the clips have been knocked down. Some of the enamel has been chipped off, anyway."

Green said that on the way back from South Morang he went to an hotel at Preston, where he had quite a lot of liquor, and then went home for lunch. After lunch he went to the Sir Henry Barkley Hotel, Heidelberg, leaving his bicycle on the footpath. When he brought the machine into the hotel about half an hour later the pump was missing. He left the hotel about 6.30 p.m. with the intention of going to Fitzroy. Green said he met two men in Bell-street, but denied he told them he was going to Glenroy or that he had been sweeping chimneys there that day. He was not feeling "too good" and went into a vacant allotment and went to sleep. He remembered waking, but had no idea of the time. He got home about 1 a.m., when he spoke to Mrs. Aitken. He paid Mrs. Aitken 6/ on the Monday.

It was correct that he had volunteered the information to the police that he had given the note away, Green said. When asked by the detectives if he could identify the men he said he did not know them. When he was taken to Glenroy he told the detectives he had never cleaned Miss Wiseman's chimneys, but that he had canvassed there.

Blood Stains Explained

Blood stains on Green's clothing were attributed by him to a puncture he received from barbed wire, while playing with the children at home. Hairs on his coat had probably got there when he threw his coat down while at work. He denied he had ever swept chimneys for Mrs. Brannigan.

Mr. Little: You, Green, had nothing to do with the murder of these two women?

Green: Definitely, no!

Mr. Book: When you were being taken on this drive to Glenroy did you ask why you were being taken there?

Green: I did; they said I would know in time.

When was the last time you said you had been at Glenroy?—Round about the beginning of August.

How many chimneys did you sweep?—Round about 10 or 12.

Did you ever hear Miss Wiseman mentioned?—I did not.

You do not suggest any detective mentioned her name?—They did not.

Did they say anything about this crime?—They did not.

Green denied that he had hesitated when asked by detectives if he had ever received a note from a woman at Coburg.

The trial will be continued this morning, when addresses by counsel will proceed.

Geelong Sitings

GEELONG, Thursday.—Mr. Acting Justice O'Bryan to-day granted decrees nisi in the following petitions:—

Alfred John Stork, Torquay-road, Belmont, poultry farmer, 31 years, from Cornelia Mavis Stork, Marshall-street, Chivwell, 32 years, the grounds of desertion. Maintenance and custody of the child and alimony were reserved.

Elvina Alexandra Gallagher, Moorabool-street, Geelong, 30 years, from Roy Anthony Gallagher, postal employee, Ballarat, 40 years, on the grounds of desertion. The question of alimony was reserved, and petitioner was granted the custody of the child.

The Equity Trustees Company is applying for administration, with the will annexed, of the estate of Mary Hilda Jamieson, late of Dandenong-road, Atmadale, spinster, who died in London on October 9, 1938. The assets are sworn at £5747, consisting of realty £121, and personally £5626, and are devised and bequeathed for the benefit of deceased's relatives.

GREEN GUILTY OF MURDER

Sentence of Death Imposed

JURY OUT 6 HOURS

George Green, 38 years, Bamfield-road, Heidelberg, chimney sweep, was found guilty by a jury in the Criminal Court last night on charges of having murdered Annie Wiseman, 63 years, and her niece, Phyllis Wiseman, 17 years, at their Glenroy home on the night of November 12. He was sentenced to death by Mr. Justice Lowe. The jury deliberated for nearly six hours.

Green, who was showing signs of strain when he entered the dock, after the jury knocked at 8.35 p.m., took the sentence calmly, and when asked by the judge's associate if he had anything to say why the sentence of the court should not be passed upon him, said, "Nothing." When the question was completed, he said, "No." The sentence was then passed and Green was removed to the cells.

The two women were found strangled in their respective bedrooms on the morning of November 13, and the Crown alleged that they had been slain about 10.30 on the previous night. A note bearing an address in Thornbury, which was alleged to have been given to Green by a woman in Coburg, was found near the body of the elder woman.

Green's defence was an alibi. He denied that he had been in the Glenroy district since the previous August, and said that when the crime was alleged to have been committed he was sleeping on a vacant allotment. He denied all knowledge of or complicity in the crime.

Much public interest centred on the trial, which began last Monday. At all sessions of the hearing the public gallery was crowded, and many people waited outside the court for the doors to be opened. While the jury was deliberating yesterday, onlookers waited in the corridors. Thirty witnesses were called by the Crown, and the transcript of evidence occupied more than 260 foolscap pages.

Although none was admitted to the gallery last night, a large crowd was congregated outside the court in Lonsdale-street.

Chain of Evidence

Green had pleaded not guilty to the charges, and was defended by Mr. L. Little (instructed by Mr. J. Barnett). Mr. Book, K.C., conducted the Crown case.

Addressing the jury when the hearing was resumed yesterday morning, Mr. Little, who spoke for two hours and 10 minutes, said some exceptionally strong links were missing from the chain of circumstantial evidence adduced by the Crown, and added that caution was necessary in weighing such evidence. Finger prints, which would have constituted one of the most important links in the chain of evidence, were missing.

Mr. Little contended that there was no evidence to show Green was within eight miles of the Wiseman home on the night of November 12. Nor was there evidence to show Green was in possession of any extra wealth at any time after November 12, or that he was in possession of anything which might have come from the Wiseman home.

"There might be many other missing links from the supposed chain of evidence, but these three are outstanding," Mr. Little said.

The jury had to be satisfied beyond reasonable doubt that the two women met their deaths somewhere about 10.30 p.m. before they could consider the question of Green's guilt. The Crown case reeked with doubt and suspicion, Mr. Little concluded.

The Judge Sums Up

In his summing up, which took an hour and 55 minutes, Mr. Justice Lowe told the jury that the circumstances of the crime precluded any motion for justification or excuses for the deaths of the two women. He saw nothing, or had heard nothing suggested, to point to the killing of either woman being manslaughter. He recapitulated the evidence presented by the Crown in support of the charges against Green and the answers Green had made to them in his sworn evidence.

"I want to say at once that with regard to the bicycle tracks and the footmarks I think you would be wise to put them out of your minds," his Honor told the jury. It seemed to him that, because of the length of time which had elapsed between the commission of the crime and the discovery of the tracks and footmarks, as well as their indefiniteness, it would be dangerous for the jury to consider them.

After discussing the alleged conversation between Green and two men in Bell-street on the Saturday night, in the course of which accused was stated to have said he was going to Glenroy, Mr. Justice Lowe said it had occurred to him that Green might have said Fitzroy and not Glenroy.

The jury retired at 2.55 p.m.



JURY AT SCENE OF MURDER

Police Evidence Heard in Court

Visits to the house at Glenroy, where Annie Wiseman, 63 years, and her niece, Phyllis Wiseman, 17 years, were allegedly slain on November 12, and to Heidelberg and other places in northern suburbs, were made yesterday by the jury hearing evidence against George Green, 38 years, chimney sweep, who is on trial in the Criminal Court on a charge of murder of the two women. The hearing, which was in its third day, and will be continued this morning, is before Mr. Justice Lowe.

Green, who has pleaded not guilty, is defended by Mr. L. Little (instructed by Mr. J. Barnett). Mr. Book, K.C., is prosecuting for the Crown.

First-Constable F. A. J. Maher, of Thornbury, who was the first police witness called yesterday, told the court he had seen Green in Gillies-street, Thornbury, on November 17. Maher told Green he wanted him to come to Thornbury police station. Green at first did not reply, and then said, "What am I wanted for?" Witness said, "Don't ask any questions." On the way to the station witness asked Green if he was married, and Green replied that he was. He said his name was George Green, and that he lived in Lower Heidelberg-road.

Detective-Sergeant F. W. Sickerdick described his visit to Miss Wiseman's house at Glenroy on Sunday morning, November 13, with Detective-Inspector Carey and Senior Detective Delminico. Later he said, they were joined by Detective-Inspector O'Keefe, Senior-Detective Lee and Detective Delaney. Witness detailed the condition of the two bedrooms in which the bodies of Miss Wiseman and her niece were lying, and the disposition of the bodies and their clothing. There was a halfpenny adhering to the elder woman's wrist. The window in the south-east corner of her room was open about 18 inches; the other windows were shut. The sill of the open window had been freshly wiped, and a damp towel was found under the mattress.

On the floor near the elder Miss Wiseman's body, witness said he found a note folded in four. In the bathroom he found five pennies, two halfpennies and 2/6 in a small envelope. Twenty-four spent wooden matches were found in the two bedrooms and the bathroom.

Accused's Movements

Sickerdick said Delminico and he saw Green at Thornbury on November 17, and asked him to come to the detective office. In the police car Delminico said, "Where have you been sweeping chimneys in the past three weeks?" Green said, "In the country and in the suburbs." Delminico said, "Where have you been in the past fortnight?" Green said, "Brunswick, Coburg, and right through to Darebin."

Asked at the detective office where he lived, Green, according to evidence, said, "Out Heidelberg way," and went on to describe the location of Mrs. Aitken's house. Later, Sickerdick, Delminico and Lee went to the house, where they obtained a bicycle, which Green told them was the one he used in his work. O'Keefe questioned Green as to the clothing he was wearing on the Saturday, and was told he was wearing the same clothing, which had not been washed or changed. The clothing was subsequently handed to the analyst.

Continuing his testimony, Sickerdick said O'Keefe asked Green if he had swept any chimneys around Glenroy. Green said he had, but could not tell the names of the people. Green, however, offered to point out the houses. Carey said, "Have you ever been recommended to go from one customer to another?" Green said, "What do you mean?" Carey then said, "Have you ever received a note from one person to go to another?" Green admitted he had, and Carey said, "Did you receive a note last Monday week?" Green hesitated for a while and then said "Yes, a woman in Coburg gave me a note to go to a place in Thornbury." Green was then taken on the police car to Kirby-street, Coburg, where he indicated the house at which the woman had given him the note.

Green was then taken toward Glenroy. Sickerdick continued, and on the way he said he had given the note to two sweeps at Merlynston on the Thursday. O'Keefe said, "Where did you meet them?" and Green said, "I don't know the street." Asked if he had gone to the house in Collins-street, Thornbury, indicated by the woman in the note, Green said he had, but that there was

no one at home. At Glenroy Green pointed out several places where he had swept chimneys. As they were passing Miss Wiseman's house, O'Keefe said, "Did you do any chimneys there?" Green said "No, I only canvassed."

While they were driving along the other side of the railway line, Sickerdick went on, O'Keefe again indicated Miss Wiseman's house, and asked if he had ever been there. Green again said, "No, I only canvassed." When they returned to the detective office, Green was questioned about his movements on the Saturday, and said he had gone to South Morang to look for work, and then went to an hotel at Preston. In the afternoon he said he went to Dawson's Hotel, at Heidelberg. O'Keefe said, "How did you go?" Green said, "On my bicycle, and I had my pump pinched during the afternoon." In answer to another question, Green said he stayed at the hotel until "kick-out time." O'Keefe said, "Where did you go then?" Green said, "I was pretty full, and I went to some vacant land and had a sleep." Further questioned by O'Keefe, Green said he stayed there until about one o'clock, and then went home.

Two Other Sweeps

After Green had been further questioned as to his movements during the previous week, he told the detectives he had given the note to the two sweeps at Alphington, Sickerdick said. O'Keefe said, "You told us they were camped at Merlynston." Green said, "They told me they were going to Merlynston." O'Keefe said, "You had a job in your pocket, and gave it away." Green said, "They asked me for a shilling, and I said 'I had not cracked it; and gave them the note, and said, 'If you go to that address you will get something.'"

O'Keefe asked Green where he had got the money he gave to Mrs. Aitken on the Sunday, and Green said he had had money. He told O'Keefe he could not take them to the place where he had slept. He told witness he had his bicycle with him, and had ridden it home. O'Keefe said, "At 10.20 p.m. last Saturday a man was seen to go in the front gate of Miss Wiseman's home with a bicycle without a light. The note you admit was given to you on November 7 was found in the room where Miss Wiseman was found. You had no money on Saturday, and yet you gave money to Mrs. Aitken on Sunday and Monday. We say you went to Glenroy to rob Miss Wiseman. When you got into the house, you did not expect to find the niece there. You got hold of her and choked her. In desperation you choked Miss Wiseman." Green replied, "I was not there. I have never been in the house."

Cross-examined by Mr. Little, Sickerdick said that as far as he knew the nickleplated bicycle pump (produced) had at no time been shown to Green, nor had a similar pump, found at Heidelberg, which came into possession of the police. Inquiries which had been made showed that Green's statement regarding his visit to South Morang on the Saturday morning was accurate.

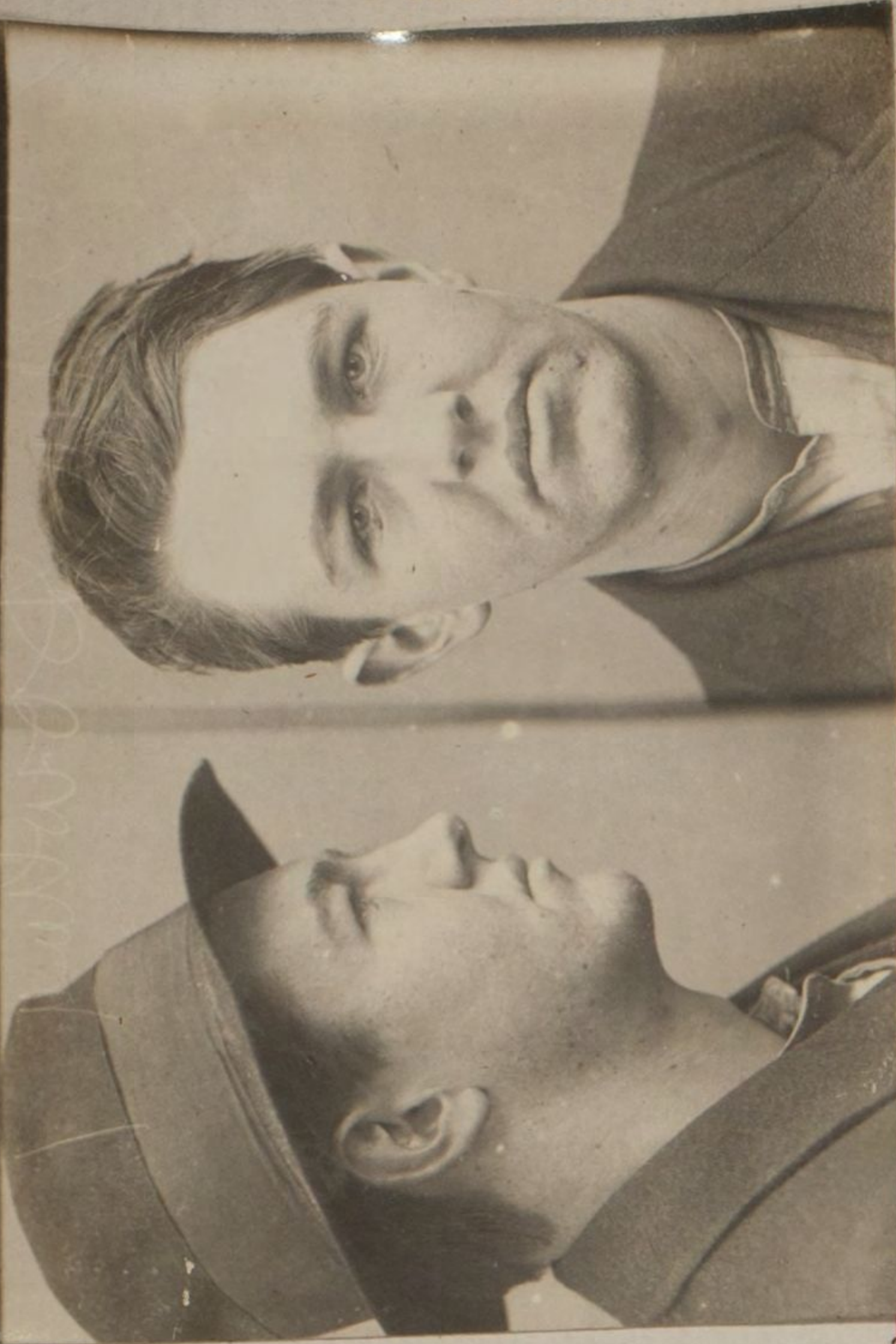
