Regulations for the control of Prisoners confined  
onboard the Penal Ships. —————

1

Each prisoner on arrival will be taken separately to the Searching Room, where he will be strictly searched by a Warder in the presence of the Chief-Warder or an Overseer, and every article taken from him, his description will then be taken and his hair closely cut, and whiskers shaved completely off. He will then wash, and all the clothing he may bring with him will be destroyed, and a suit of the stew's clothing furnished him which will consist of

- 1 Jacket or Frock
- 1 Pair of Trowsers
- 2 Shirts
- 1 Pair of Shoes
- 1 Hat or cap

2

If not viewed on arrival he will then be placed in irons which will never under any circumstances be removed except by the special direction of His Excellency the Governor.

He will immediately be placed in a Cell where he will be kept in close confinement during the period he remains on board.

4

Each prisoner will be supplied with the following Articles, Viz. 1 Rug, 2 Blankets, Plate, Tannicaw, and Spoon, comb and brock which he will be required to keep clean.

5

They will rise every morning at 6 o'clock in summer and 7 in Winter when they will wash, fold up their bedding and each clean out his own Cell, the Bedding will then be removed.

6

The Breakfast will be served out at 8 o'clock and the dinner at 12. The supper will be issued at 5 P.M. in summer and 4 in winter.

7

The Bedding will be returned at 5 P.M. in Winter and 6 in summer, and they will be required to be in bed by 6 in Winter and 7 in summer.

8

They will be strictly searched every morning and evening and will not be

be permitted to have in their possession any article whatever beyond that issued to them by the Government.

9

Strict silence will upon all occasions whether in the Cells or at exercise be enforced.

10

Should a prisoner require any thing while in his Cell he will apply to the Warder on duty.

11

They will be allowed on deck for exercise at such periods as may be convenient but never to exceed ten at one time and in marching round the deck they will never approach each other nearer than 4 paces.

12

Each prisoner who can read will be supplied with a Bible and Prayer Book and allowed the constant use of them as long as they are kept without being damaged.

13

A Record of each prisoners Crime, sentence and character with the period he may have to serve on board the *Stella* will be hung up in his Cell on which also will be entered Monthly his character and conduct during the past month.

14

No person will at any time be

be permitted to see a prisoner except the Officers of the Hulk, nor will any communication either by letters or otherwise be permitted to take place.

15

Any prisoner moving from his allotted place in the Rank when at exercise or making the slightest movement at any time indicative of any attempt to escape will render himself liable to be shot by the Warder or other person in whose charge he may be, and each prisoner is hereby duly warned and cautioned that if he infringes or departs from this Rule he does so at his own risk and peril.

16

They must bear in mind that it is by the most exemplary conduct alone during the whole time that they are onboard that they will be allowed to emerge into the second stage at the expiration of their allotted periods. The slightest irregularity, want of cleanliness, insolence, riotous or disorderly conduct, attempting to hold communication with a fellow prisoner, or any other person except the Officers of the Hulk on matters of discipline, disobedience of any orders, damaging or destroying any article and any other act of misconduct will not only subject them

to

to immediate punishment, but their allotted period of service onboard the Hulk will recommence from the date of such punishment.

17

At frequent uncertain periods during the month they will have an opportunity of making complaints to the Inspector General of any grievance under which they may consider themselves to be labouring.

*The actual pecuniary Return afforded amounted to £196. 0. 3 which has been paid into the Colonial Treasury, the total value of the work performed is estimated at £584. 0. 9/2*

*There is no classification directed by Colonial Act. nor is it practicable to carry out any system on board.*

*No persons are allowed to see the prisoners nor are they permitted to receive letters unless by the express sanction of the Inspector General. Flannels only are permitted in addition to the ordinary prison clothing.*

*No dissenting Ministers attend but there are no particular restrictions*

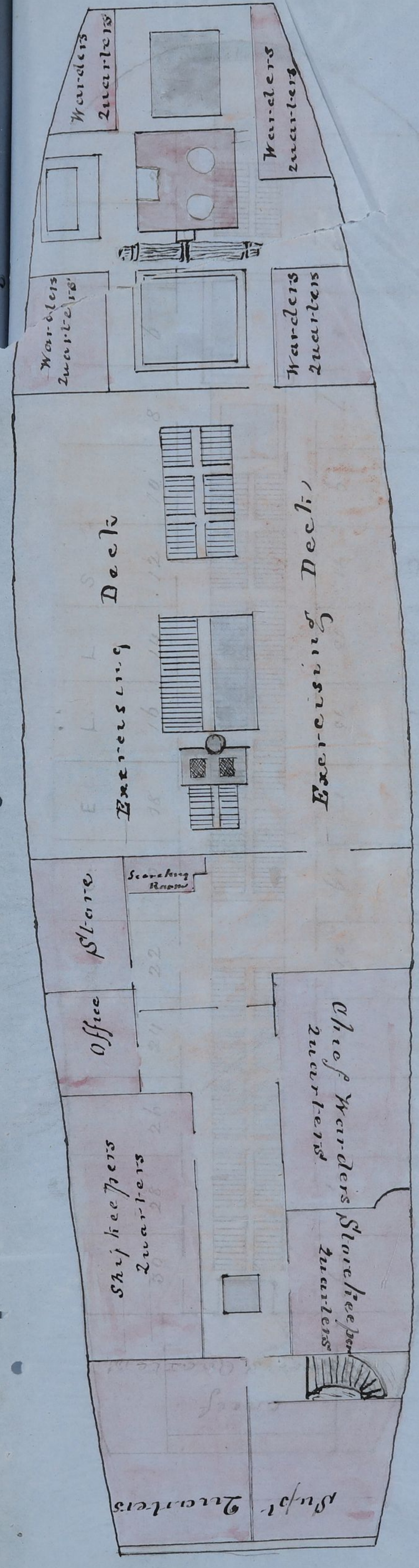

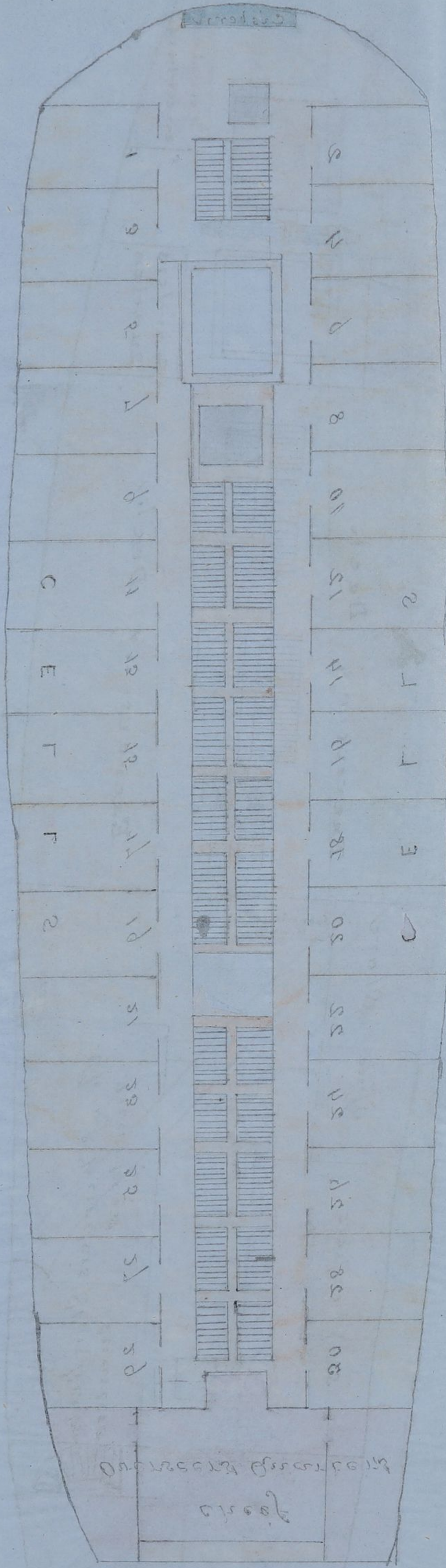
Plan of main deck Hull Success

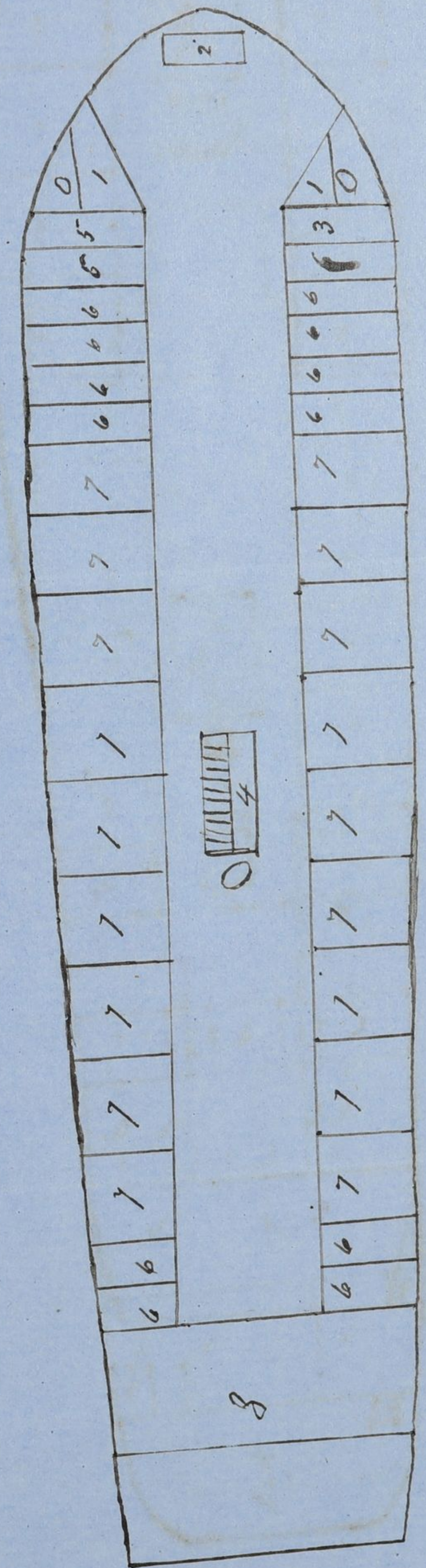
Top Deck - Heavy Gun Quarter

- Top Deck of Prison -

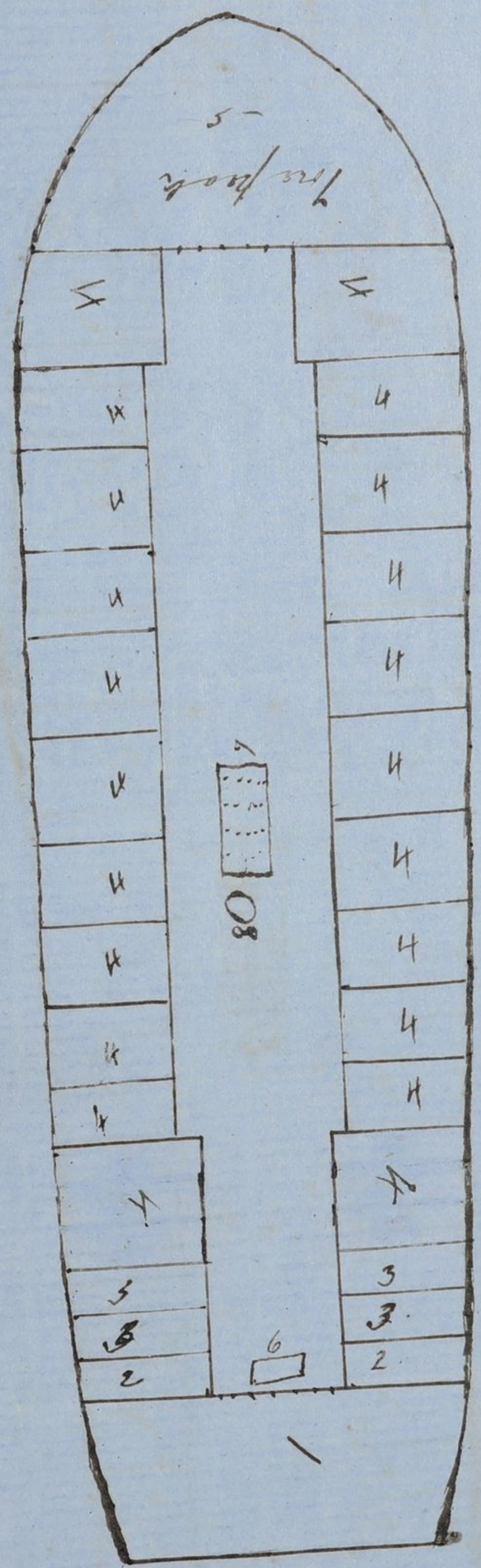

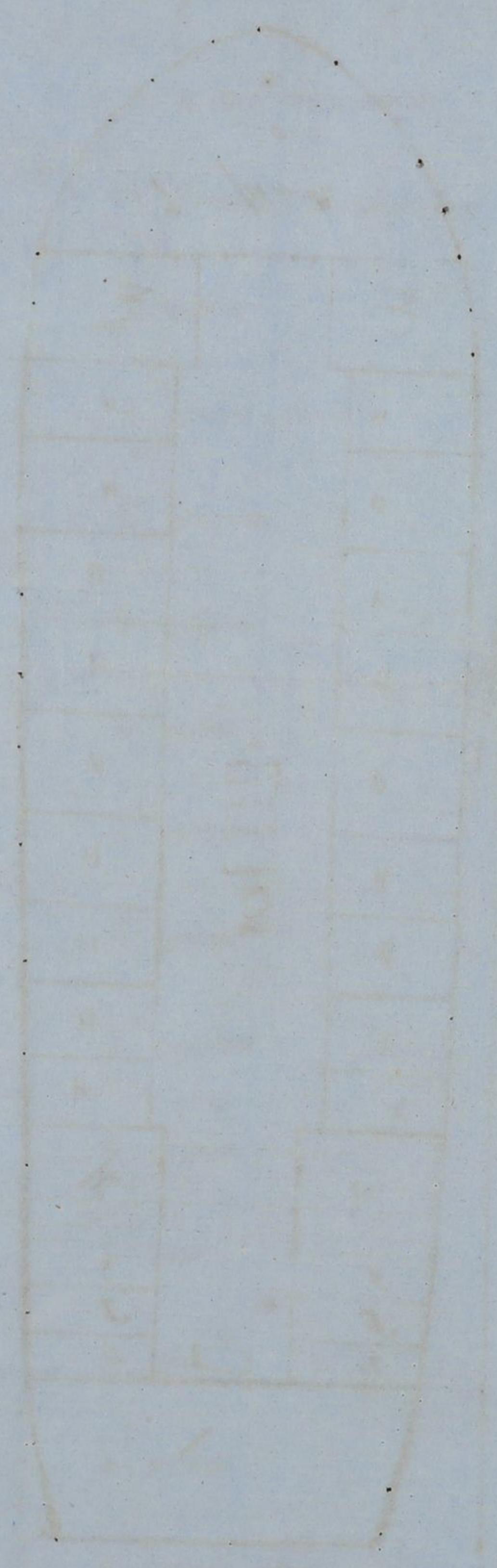

The Commissioner of Public Works reports that the Government House has been inspected by an Officer of his Department and that with the exception of a few very trifling defects the building is in a perfectly satisfactory state of repair. -
