This Deponent Edward Pratt

on his oath saith as follows: I am a miner living at Lampough and am a mate of the deceased - Yesterday as usual I went to work with him I was in the act of lowering him down the hole when one of the legs of the windlass stand broke and the windlass flew round knocked me on the forehead and gave me the wound there and then fell down the hole and must have struck deceased on the side of the back - The hole is

about seventy five deep and de-
-ceased must have been about
twenty feet from the top when
the windlass of broke - I have
often been let down the same
hole with the same windlass
and considered it safe until
this accident happened - It was
about a quarter of an hour before
deceased was taken out of the hole
when got out he was alive but
insensible, he lived about five
minutes after he was brought
up. He was 29 years of age and a
native of Leicester.

His lips were blanched I con-
-sider the cause of death
was internal hemorrhage

produced by the fractured portions
of the Ribs wounding the Liver
I know nothing more likely to
cause such an accident - as
a Window Barrel falling on
a person from a height -
In fact - the Bruise correspon-
- ded with the end of the
Window Barrel.
