This Deponent John Earl

on his oath saith as follows:

I am a Miner and live at Maryborough — Yesterday evening about half past 5 o'clock I went to Mr Boullemers' house to engage him to play the Fiddle at a wedding that had taken place at Hawkes. I knocked at the door I got no answer the first time about 8 or 9 o'clock, I went again about 10 o'clock & knocked again but got no answer I went again about half past 5 o'clock & knocked again & then got no answer I enquired of some neighbours if they had seen him & they said no — I then went again & knocked but got no answer, I then in the presence of William Faulkhead (who lives next-door to deceased) pulled up the front window, which was closed but not fastened and went into the place where (the front room) I then went into deceased's Bed Room where

I saw deceased lying on the floor, with nothing but his shirt on, his breast - was bare and his legs & belly uncovered - I spoke to him but got no answer, he appeared insensible, I did not touch him but left the place & went to Doctor Laidman for attendance, I last saw deceased on Monday night ~~at~~ about eleven o'clock, he came to the Golden Eye Hotel for his music stand, he appeared quite well - ~~Dr~~ Dr Laidman J.M. came to the place where deceased was at once & recommended him to be removed to the Hospital, Deceased was lying beside his bed as if he had fallen out of it - and was breathing very heavily through his nostrils -

This Deponent *William Faulkhead*

on his oath saith as follows:

I am a Carter living at Marborough — I have known the deceased for the last seven weeks, he was my next door neighbour, I last saw him on Monday evening last, he came out of his place for some wood, he appeared quite well and I wished him good evening he lived by himself & was of temperate habits, he was a musician.

Yesterday evening about 5 or 6 o'clock I heard some one knocking at deceased's door I went out & knocked at the door

John Earl was there & knocked and told me that he had been at deceased's to engage him to play at Hawkes's wedding party I looked in through the window and saw deceased in a black Hat & I concluded that he was in because he had but the one Hat —

I thought that something was wrong and
I helped Carl in through the front window
He (Carl) got inside & was inside a few
seconds & returned & said he thought deceased
was dying, He then went for Dr Laidman
who returned with him in a few minutes
& saw deceased & said deceased was dying
& recommended his removal to the Mary
borough Hospital where deceased died
some few hours after

I never knew deceased have any one call
on him excepting those that he taught
the fiddle to, he always lived by himself

Deceased appeared rather low in cir-
cumstances but was generally in
good spirits

This Deponent *Robert Henry Dunn*

on his oath saith as follows:

I am legally qualified to practice medicine in this Colony and live at Marborough and am resident Surgeon to the Hospital. Last night about

7 o'clock ^{*deceased*} *was admitted to the Marborough Hospital, he was almost pulseless, insensible, with cold extremities, I noticed*

J.M.

three marks of on his face of slight importance. There were on the left side, there was an abrasion of skin on the left elbow & considerable contusion on it. None of these injuries were of any importance & had nothing to do with death. The Brain was considerably congested and there was a large clot of blood in the right ventricle & a smaller one in the left. The other organs of the Body were healthy

The cause of this man's death
was "Sanguineous Apoplexy"
About ~~four~~ four or five ounces of J.M.
Blood were in the Ventricle.
A man being attacked in this way
would become insensible at once
but might linger some hours until
death took place.
