on his oath saith as follows:—

The deceased was my father
his age about sixty five years, his
name *Roderick Campbell*, we have
been in the Colony rather more than
four years, On Tuesday evening last
on returning home from Melbourne
with a bullock dray, near the
Reheat Public house at Pentridge
he was riding on the pole of the dray
and the wheel passing over a stone
jerked him off, and the wheel passed
over his right arm and thigh, two
Doctors passing by at the time examined
the injury, and advised my taking him
on a stretcher to a neighbouring house
and after a day or two he was brought

to the Hospital according to their advice
where he lingered until yesterday afternoon
when he expired, he was perfectly sober at
the time of the accident occurring

good and lawful men of *Melbourne* in the said *Colony* who being duly sworn and charged to

enquire, upon the part of our Lady the Queen, when, where, how, and by what means the said *Roderick Campbell* came

by *his* death, do say upon their oath that § *the said Roderick Campbell* was accidentally killed in consequence of being *thrust* from the pole of a certain bullock dray whilst in motion whereby he was so severely injured by the wheel of the same passing over his right thigh and arm that after lingering about four or five days he expired

§ Here state cause of death, if known; if unknown, doubtful, or no evidence, state the fact accordingly, using the words of the Verdict of the Jury.
It is desirable that the Jury should find expressly whether there are or are not marks of external violence on the body of deceased.
