By order of the Police I made a Post Mortem examination on the body of *Zelman William Gloistein* at the *Sunbury Asylum Jan. 24th*.
The body was fairly well nourished with the exception of the legs which were very much wasted. They were very much discoloured & showed all the signs of chronic ulceration. The legs were drawn up ~~to~~ nearly at right angles to the body owing to contraction of the ham string tendons. There was a sore on the right heel nearly circular in form of about an inch & a half in diameter. The sore appeared to have been healing. The ulcers on legs & heel were evidently of a Syphilitic origin. The brain was softened and the blood vessels were all in an enlarged condition. There was an excess of serum in the ventricles. The lungs were healthy with the exception of a ~~patch~~ congested patch at right base. The kidneys were very much diseased showing signs of chronic cirrhosis. The liver was rather large and I found a good sized gumma near the anterior surface of right lobe. The bladder showed signs of chronic inflammation.
I consider the Cause of death was uramic poisoning the result of kidney disease probably of a Syphilitic origin.

From the records of the Asylum, I find that the deceased, Zelman William Glosster, aged about 77 years, was admitted into this Institution, on the 1st December 1894, on the authority of the warrant now produced, & suffering from dementia & in feeble bodily health.

The patient came under my care on the 3rd instant, when he was demented; bedridden from paralysis of the lower extremities, & generally in a very feeble condition.

In the above state he lingered until the 18th instant when he had an epileptoid attack, & appeared to become partially paralysed, in the throat, & about the 21st inst. he developed an attack of Pneumonia, which was treated with the ordinary remedies, but the patient never rallied & sank & died at 10.20 p.m. on the 22nd inst.

There is a large ulcer on heel caused while restless.

In my opinion the ulcer on the heel could not be prevented.

The deceased Yelmau William Gloystein, came under my charge at the Hospital ward on the 10th day of April 1891. He was then in fair bodily health, but owing to a slight attack of Paralysis he was not able to take much exercise. He has been confined to bed since November the 12th 1891 except a few short intervals and permanently in bed since 4th of July 1892. He was suffering from affection of the Kidneys and intermittent diarrhoea. On the 5th of September 1892 his legs contracted a little. There was no marked change from that date until last Saturday morning when ~~he~~ he had a slight fit. He then commenced to refuse his food. He took a change for the worse on ~~the~~ Monday, and died at 10.20 pm. Dr Stiel saw him regularly and prescribed for him, and the medicine was given as ordered. He had a small sore on the right heel caused naturally
