*jointly and severally* make oath and say—

1. That we are seeking to obtain Probate of the Will \_\_\_\_\_  
of the above-named *William Sullivan* \_\_\_\_\_ deceased.

2. The said deceased died on the *Nineteenth* day of *January*  
*One thousand nine hundred and one*  
at *Alexandra Parade*.

3. The said deceased left a Will bearing date the *Twenty first* - day of  
*December* One thousand *nine hundred* - which is as we  
believe the last Will and Testament of the said deceased and which is unrevoked

4. By his said Will the testator appointed us *Margaret Sullivan of Alexandra*  
*Parade Fitzroy widow and Eugene Sullivan also of Alexandra*  
*Parade Fitzroy Laborer* as *deponents*  
*executors thereof and Executors thereof*

5. The paper-writing hereunto annexed marked "A" is the true last Will and  
Testament of the said deceased as we verily believe.

6. The said Will was executed in the presence of *John Brehoney of number*  
*56 Alexandra Parade Fitzroy in the State of Victoria Signaller*  
*and Michael Healey of Brunswick Street Fitzroy in said*  
*State Licensed Victualler*.

7. The said deceased left property in Victoria not exceeding in value the sum  
*of One thousand three hundred and twenty four pounds eight shillings and four pence* consisting of real estate  
of the value of £ *8534 - 10 - 0* and personal estate  
of the value of £ *789 - 18 - 4*

8. That if we obtain probate we will well and truly collect and administer according to law to the best of our knowledge and ability the property, lands, and hereditaments, goods, chattels and credits of the said deceased at the time of his death which at any time after shall come to the power or control, hands or possession of us as his executors or of any other person or persons for us that we will make or cause to be made a true and perfect inventory of all and singular the property, lands and hereditaments, goods chattels and credits of the said deceased which shall have come to the hands, possession or knowledge of us or to the hands or possession of any other person or persons for us and the same so made will sign with our proper hand writing and will exhibit and deposit, or cause to be exhibited and deposited the same inventory in the office of the Master-in-Equity within three calendar months next ensuing the order granting Probate and further that we will make or cause to be made a true and just account of the administration of the estate which we have undertaken as to our receipts and disbursements, and as to what portion is retained by us and what portion remains uncollected and the same so made will sign with our proper handwriting, and will exhibit and deposit, or cause to be exhibited and deposited, the same account in the said office of the Master-in-Equity within fifteen calendar months next ensuing the order granting probate.

9. That to the best of our knowledge, information and belief, the said deceased did not within the space of two years preceding the date of his death convey or otherwise dispose of, for other than adequate valuable consideration any real or personal property of which he was seized or possessed

give and bequeath to my wife "Margaret Sullivan" the  
sum of Fifty pounds also all the Furniture that may  
be in the House at the time of my death together with the  
Horse Harness and Buggy - To my Son Eugene Sullivan  
I give and bequeath from my Watch and Chain -

To Each of my Wives Nieces "Margaret Kiernan"  
Mary Kiernan and "Sarah Kiernan" I give  
and bequeath the sum of Ten pounds - And I direct  
the sum of Twenty pounds to be set aside for masses  
for the repose of my Soul all of which above mentioned  
sums are to be paid free of Legacy Duty -

And as to all my other personal Estate including  
money in Bank or deposit or otherwise howsoever I give  
and bequeath same to my Wife and two Sons Eugene  
Sullivan and John Sullivan to be divided equally between  
them - I give and devise my property known as the  
General Gordon Hotel situate at the corner of Brunswick  
Street and Alexandra Parade as also my property known as  
number 90 Alexandra Parade to my Wife Margaret  
Sullivan absolutely - My properties in Brunswick Street  
and known as numbers 443, 445 and 447 as also  
the property numbered 88 Alexandra Parade I give  
and devise same to my Son "Eugene Sullivan" to  
and for his own use absolutely - To my Son "John  
Sullivan" I give and devise my properties situate at  
449 Brunswick Street Fitzroy as also the two Cottages  
situate in Westgarth Street Fitzroy and known as numbers  
108 and 110 to and for his own use absolutely -

As to my property situate in Alexandra Parade  
and known as number 72 and as now occupied by me

I give and devise same together with the vacant -  
Land adjoining to my wife Margaret Sullivan during  
her lifetime and after her death I direct said property  
to be sold and the proceeds derived therefrom to be  
equally divided among my two Sons Eugene Sullivan  
and John Sullivan share and share alike and if only  
one living to such one absolutely - And I direct if my  
wife should re marry any share or interest she might  
have under this my Will shall lapse and all her interest  
shall be equally divided among my two Sons Eugene  
Sullivan and John Sullivan - I hereby appoint my  
wife Margaret Sullivan and my Son Eugene Sullivan  
Executrix and Executor of this my Will ~~My~~  
~~Witness~~ whereof I have hereunto set my hand  
this Twenty first day of December One thousand  
nine hundred —
