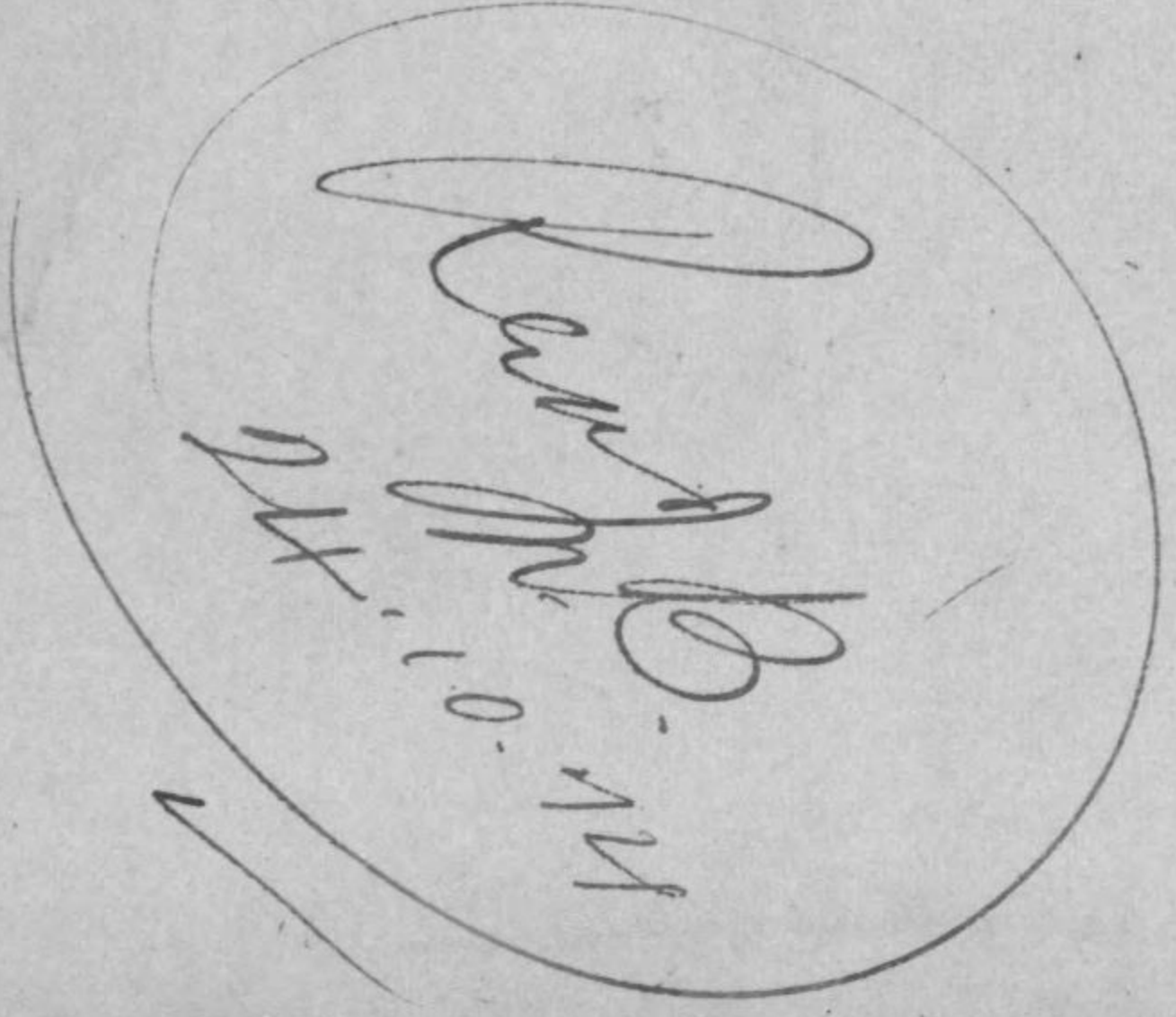

He had a room to himself I did not know him up in the night - I went to call him in the next morning to breakfast at eight o'clock - I got no answer I opened the door I found him lying insensible on bed I got a doctor to see him who advised that I should send the deceased to the Hospital which I did -

on his oath saith, I am a Magistral Surgeon

residing at the Melbourne Hospital

The deceased Devenish was brought to this Hospital in the morning of the seventeenth instant - he was then quite insensible. his face was livid pupils contracted. The deceased now rallied and was found in the night. I then made a post mortem examination of the body externally there were no marks of violence - Internally I found the brain and its membranes greatly congested - the brain was otherwise healthy - I found the lungs well heart quite healthy as were also the liver and stomach - there were no indications of Poison - I found the kidneys in a state of fatty degeneration. The other organs were healthy.

The cause of death was a probable one probably to the disease of the kidneys
