I James Davy Dodgson of Brunswick near
Melbourne in the Colony of Victoria Wesleyan Minister make
oath and say

1. That my wife Caroline Elizabeth Dodgson formerly
of Conyngham in the parish of Bellarine and late of
Brunswick in the said Colony departed this life on the
third day of October One thousand eight hundred and
seventy four
2. That I believe the annexed paper writing
marked 'A' to be the true last Will of the said
deceased to the making of which said Will I
assented.
3. That I am the sole Executor named in
and appointed by the said Will
4. That the said deceased had at the
time of her death real and personal estate
in the said Colony
5. That I am seeking to obtain probate
of the said Will
6. That if I obtain probate I will well and
truly Collect and administer according to law to the
best of my knowledge and ability the property lands
and hereditaments goods chattels and credits of the
said deceased at the time of her death which at

any time after shall come to the power or control hands or possession of me as her Executor or of any other person or persons for me that I will make or cause to be made a true and perfect Inventory of all and singular the property lands and hereditaments goods chattels and credits of the said deceased which shall have come to the hands possession or knowledge of me or to the hands or possession of any other person or persons for me and the same so made will sign with my proper handwriting and will exhibit and deposit or cause to be exhibited and deposited the same Inventory in the office of the Master in Equity within three calendar months next ensuing the order granting probate And further that I will make or cause to be made a true and just account of the Administration of the estate which I have undertaken as to my receipts and disbursements and as to what portion is retained by me and what portion remains uncollected and the same so made will sign with my proper handwriting and will exhibit and deposit or cause to be exhibited and deposited the same account in the said Office of the Master in Equity within fifteen calendar months next ensuing the order granting Probate.

7 That I will pay all the debts and legacies of the said deceased so far as the property left by her will extend and the law bind me so to do.

8. That I believe the whole of the personal estate of the said deceased in the said Colony does not exceed in value One hundred and eleven pounds and that the whole of the real estate of the said deceased does not exceed in value Four thousand one hundred and ten pounds making together the sum of Four thousand seven hundred and twenty one pounds.

This is the last Will & Testament of
me Caroline Elizabeth Dodgson of
Corigule, in the Parish of Bellarine, County
of Grant, Victoria, Australia, wife
of the Reverend James Davy Dodgson
Minister, now residing
at Maldon, Victoria, Australia.

I give & bequeath the estate of
Corigule, Parish of Bellarine, County of
Grant, Victoria, Australia, (by virtue
of the power in the Mortgage Deed
on the said estate of Corigule which
Mortgage is held by Mr De La Hunt
for the sum of two thousand pounds
lent on the security of the said estate
which makes it competent for me
to dispose of the said estate of
Corigule to my husband for his
absolute use, and without any
restrictions as I know that he
will act justly in the disposal
of the said estate. As any
other real estate will necessarily
go to my sister as my heir at
law

I have no further provision to
make. And I hereby appoint
my dear husband the Reverend
James Doug Dodgson, Wesleyan
Minister Sole Executor of
this my last will and Testament,
and I hereby revoke all other wills
I may have made. In witness
whereof I have hereunder set my hand this
third day of December in the year of our Lord 1866.
